Greetings WPS Membership; welcome to summer and all the sweltering!

While recognizing the many squadron members that serve our community in my last communication, I forgot our good friend Geri Walker. Geri helps the Sunday Breakfast Mission on Tuesday evenings with her superb nursing skills.

I would like to revisit Maryland House Bill 1345 that I highlighted in the last Lubbers Line. This bill is sponsored by Ways and Means Committee Chair Sheila Hixson (D-Montgomery) and Delegate Heather R. Mizeur (D-Montgomery). This bill, if passed would add a 1-percent luxury surtax to the state sales and use tax on motor vehicles, boats and planes with a price greater than \$35,000. For vehicles, boats and planes with a price of more than \$90,000, the surtax would be \$550 plus 2 percent of the amount above \$90,000. A petition is circulating on Change.org to oppose the bill, which it says will have significant negative ramifications to the marine industry in MD. I encourage you to get involved if you are a MD boat owner.

My spin...hopefully this bill will not pass, but only because the MD legislature has decided to include the airplane industry for which I am told has a significant lobby to defeat it. I suppose one pays more for a jet than a sailboat.

I hope all enjoyed the 2012 Cruise and the "almost" run-in with the Sailabration in Baltimore on 13-19 June. The WPS Cruise did get into Baltimore, but just two days later on Friday 22nd. Many of our group saw some of the tall ships making their way southward since they could not clear the bridges on the C&D Canal. Our crew saw a very unusual ship of cranes anchored in the middle of the bay near our destination for Monday: Herrington Harbor South. This ship was huge and I truly am sorry for not capturing an image of it for each of you to view. We saw it again the next day while participating in Tom Webster's navigation exercise.

At this point, I'd like to share a boating learning experience. I don't know if it's me but it seems over the past several years we've been experiencing increasingly violent weather. And that was the case in early July when we endured an extremely violent thunderstorm which rolled into the Sassafras River (where we keep our boat) about midnight. The storm lasted about 40 minutes with 70-80mph winds with more lightning strikes than I've ever seen. We happened to be at our boat that evening and we had just finished watching a movie aboard with friends when we turned on the 11:00 news and saw reports of very violent weather that, at that time, was hammering the Baltimore area and headed our way. So our friends scurried back to their boat and I checked our lines. We started off to bed but it didn't take long before the extreme winds hit and the lightning grew closer. We watched the wind, water, lightning and rain from inside our salon (which may or may not have been wise) and watched as various boat debris blew and floated about in the wind. First, an unmanned kayak went by, and then we saw various cushions and chairs go by. We also watched a main sail on a nearby sailboat get shredded by the wind. Our marina lost power quite early in the storm and power wasn't restored for nearly four days (which also coincided with our vacation week). Fortunately, we

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have a generator and had food and ice to carry us over the next couple of days, but the damage to the area of Maryland was shocking with trees and limbs down in an extremely large area.

I didn't hear of any injuries, but some boats in our marina were damaged. The old duPont Boat shed just up the river from us also succumbed to the storm's wrath. I also heard of one rather large boat that was anchored out whose anchor dragged about 100 yards during the storm. We didn't experience any damage to our boat and I credit that to us having the opportunity to check our lines as the storm approached and to the fact that beginning last fall I began doubling up all my lines. Our boat stays in the water in a covered shed year round and it dawned on me last fall to just leave the doubled lines on throughout the winter in the event a severe weather event occurred. That way, I wouldn't have to rush down to the boat in potentially ugly

Boating Safety News

A REVIEW OF CPR

In 2010 the American Heart Association changed the recommended process for victims of cardiac arrest after studies showed <u>compression-only</u> CPR as effective as giving "rescue breaths". However in a recent Red Cross CPR course I attended, compressions as well as "rescue breaths" were recommended.

Here is a short review of the CPR procedure:

- 1) First make sure the scene is secure and presents no danger to you, such as fire, electric wires, etc. When the danger cannot be avoided move the victim.
- 2) If the person is not responsive and not breathing, or not breathing normally, call 911.
- 3) Place the victim on his or her back. Make sure the airway is open by looking in their mouth for any obstructions. To open the airway, push down on the forehead while pulling up on the bony part of the chin with two or three fingers of your other hand. Check for breathing by positioning yourself so you can look to see if the person's chest clearly rises and falls; listen for escaping air and feel for it against the side of your face. If the person needs CPR proceed as follows.
- 4) Place the heel of one hand on the victim's breastbone and your other hand on top of the first, palm-down.
- 5) Position your body directly over your hands, so that your arms are straight and somewhat rigid.
- 6) Push hard, push fast <u>at a rate</u> of at least 100 compressions per minute. As you give the compression, count out loud, "One and two and three.." saying the number as you push and as you come up as you say "and".
- 7) After 30 compressions open the airway (see #3), pinch the nose shut and then make a complete seal over the person's mouth. Blow in for about 1 second.
 - If the breath goes in (you should see the chest slightly rise) give a second rescue breath. If the breath does not go in, re-position the head and try again. Each cycle of chest compressions and rescue breaths should take about 24 seconds. Minimize the interruption of chest compressions.
- 8) Stop CPR if anytime you notice that the person is breathing.
- 9) Continue until someone takes over for you, emergency personnel arrive, you are too exhausted to continue, an AED is available, or signs of life return.

Rallye Series Activities

Tom Stoner: Thought it would be good to report the results and point out how close some of the positions were. Everyone can see how they fit into the results, however tactics with current and wind shifts – or whether there was more wind inside or outside, were factors that need to be the end of the day discussions. I would like to thank those that joined us for a discussion of the rallye to Herrington Harbour. It seemed there was good interest in how to analyze how the day went and the differences in boat locations during the day. John has a faster boat than he lets on as suggested by the results of that day in spite of him sailing "close to the marks". Of course Don sailed a similar race, although wind shifts were more of a factor for him. If you look at the corrected time finished there was some close finishes among quite a variety of boats. Now that I've sparked some further interest in discussing the details, I am hoping to have a day on the water in the fall on a few – or even a couple boats – out of Rock Hall to try some sailing trim and tactics and then have dinner and discuss the day over some good food/brew and company.

Yes, the light air was a factor also, however *Mystic Star* showed a good day leaving Annapolis on the much modified course. So think about that day and what might have been if you just Well you get the picture. The more situations that can be reviewed, the better the learning curve regarding how your boat performs. 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weather to make sure it's secure. While maybe my boat looks like it's entangled in a spiders web, it really doesn't take that much longer to tie it up with the double bow, stern and spring lines than it does to single lines. And I can feel secure about it anytime ugly weather is forecasted. So if you have a second set of lines, why not use them? It's one less thing to find storage for and you too can find comfort in knowing your boat has that extra protection. And I'd also encourage you to store any exterior chairs or movable objects like cushions whenever you leave your boat. Not only will that protect your boat when these things get shifted about, you also avoid losing them if they were to otherwise blow off your boat.

For me, the Wilmington Power Squadron, and in particular its educational activities enable me to be a more competent and confident boater. The amount of experience among its members is amazing and the Squadron's social and educational activities provide us the opportunity to soak that all in, so please join us whenever you can. You'll be a better boater for it and you'll have the opportunity to make and keep new friends.
