SKILLS + EXPERIENCE = CONFIDENCE

Confidence in any sport is gained through learning key skills combined with practical use of those skills (experience). Confident boaters use their boats more often and derive more pleasure from their investment. Our squadron is the perfect place to gain the necessary skills and experience to enhance your confidence on the water.

Our organization is for the most part, divided into two groups relative to experience and skill. One group that has taken a majority of our courses and the other group still has a great opportunity to learn. I encourage first mates and family members to take advantage of our courses. When you do, you will find yourself boating more, having more fun, lowering the stress of the captain or taking on that role yourself, and practicing safer boating.

We realize that your time is precious so we have developed about 15 short (2 hour) seminars on a variety of topics. These more focused learning opportunities can grow key skills without a huge time investment and may also stimulate interest in some of the more intense courses. We will offer three seminars collaboratively with the City of Newark in February (see more details in this issue) and others for members only each month this spring.

Our national organization is also evolving a new type of boating certification in response to a United Nations desire to move to more rigorous licensing of boaters. Some other nations, such as New Zealand, already have rigorous boating certification requirements. While this may be more than a decade off in the USA, USPS is getting ready. As this rolls out, members taking a series of seminars and courses and passing an on-water skill demonstration, will receive progressive levels of certification from Inland to Coastal, to Near Coastal to Ocean. These certifications will not only prove proficiency when chartering or applying for insurance, but will give you confidence so you can have more fun while boating. That's what we are about: FRIENDS, FUN, and BETTER BOATING

Boating Safety News

Carbon Monoxide and You

I often wondered if we should consider carbon monoxide monitors on Wind Venture. We do not have a generator so do not have a ready source of CO. After seeing some articles about boating and CO, I have changed my mind and this spring will be installing CO monitors on Wind Venture.

The danger of CO is far greater than simply what your boat will produce. The following is a chart of the symptoms of CO poisoning (note the similarity to sea sickness):

Concentration of CO to Air	Symptoms and Time
100 ppm .01%	Slight headache in 2-3 hours.
400 ppm .04%	Frontal headache in 1-2 hours. Widespread in 2.5-3.5 hours.
800 ppm .08%	Dizziness, nausea, convulsions in 45 minutes. Insensible in 2 hours.
1,600 ppm .16%	Headache, dizziness, nausea in 20 minutes. Death within 30 minutes.
3,200 ppm .32%	Headache, dizziness, nausea in 5 minutes. Death within 30 minutes.
6,400 ppm .64%	Headache, dizziness within 1-2 minutes. Death in less than 15 minutes.

The Effects of Carbon Monoxide

Carbon monoxide (CO) can overcome a person quickly, and in high concentrations, can be fatal in just minutes — see the chart. The most prevalent source of CO is exhaust from gasoline engines and generators. These fumes reach boaters from leaks in the exhaust system, fumes sucked back into the boat, or from other boats. There are many ways CO can find its way aboard.


Since carbon monoxide is colorless and odorless, the installation of CO detectors aboard all recreational boats is recommended. The American Boat and Yacht Council now requires all new boats with gasoline inboards or generators to have a CO detector installed. Be sure to use a carbon monoxide detector designed for marine use. These are calibrated at a significantly different standard than household detectors.

Remember: gasoline detectors don't detect CO!

Avoid These Death Zones!

- Swimming near or under the back deck or swim platform. Carbon monoxide from exhaust pipes of inboard engines, outboard engines and generators build up inside and outside the boat in areas near exhaust vents. STAY AWAY from these exhaust vent areas and DO NOT swim in these areas when the motor or generator is operating. On calm days, wait at least 15 minutes after the motor or generator has been shut off before entering these areas. NEVER enter an enclosed area under a swim platform where exhaust is vented, not even for a second. It only takes one or two breaths of the air in this "death chamber" for it to be fatal.
- <u>Blockage of exhaust outlets</u> can cause carbon monoxide to accumulate in the cabin and cockpit area even when hatches, windows, portholes, and doors are closed.
- Exhaust from another vessel that is docked, beached, or anchored alongside your boat can emit poisonous carbon monoxide gas into the cabin and cockpit of your boat. Even with properly vented exhaust, your boat should be a minimum of 20 feet from the nearest boat that is running a generator or engine.
- <u>Slow speeds or idling in the water</u> can cause carbon monoxide gas to accumulate in the cabin, cockpit, bridge, and aft deck, even in an open area. A tailwind (force of wind entering from aft section of the motorboat) can also increase accumulation.
- The "station wagon effect," or backdrafting can cause carbon monoxide to accumulate inside the cabin, cockpit, and bridge. This occurs when operating the boat at a high bow angle, with improper or heavy loading or if there is an opening which draws in exhaust. This effect can also cause carbon monoxide to accumulate inside the cabin, cockpit, aft deck, and bridge when protective coverings are used and the boat is underway.
- Teak surfing, dragging and water-skiing within 20 feet of a moving watercraft can be fatal.


