OMG, I didn't know that!!!

There is one great benefit about the average age of the Wilmington Power Squadron being on the "gray" side: we have lots of memories and meanderings about the history of the organization as it took shape and grew in strength.

Did you know that WPS was founded in 1938 with about 30 members – when we had boatyards, not marinas?

That USPS did not allow women to be members – only 'Certificate Holders' – but they could take squadron courses, and that a WPS member's wife, Clare Livingston, was the first woman in the nation to pass all USPS advanced grade courses?

Or, that about 50 years ago a dozen or so WPS members (and, yes, certificate holding wives) started a popular band called the Exhaust Pipers?

The Power Squadron's Executive Committee would like your help in collecting the bits and pieces of oral history that you often share with each other relaxing in the cockpit of the boat so that we can preserve this information in a new link on the WPS award-winning website.

Past Commander Jay Minshall has helped launch this exciting collaborative project by putting some of his memories to paper. Jay started tinkering with boats as a youngster, took his first squadron course while in Wilmington High School, and then joined his first power squadron a few years later in Rochester, NY.

Jay shares how he came to chair a committee that started the "Day of Instruction Afloat" that was taught every Spring and Fall for more than 10 years, sometimes with more than 100 students aboard dozens of squadron boats. Jay also writes:

Executive Department

A course alteration for Coop Charting

Technological change ends up solving problems and yet at the same time technology always seems to create a new set of problems. The way we do piloting and navigation has undergone a profound change during the last decade, finding our way across the waters much easier. However, one of the unintended consequences of the GPS reality is that the way we help NOAA with our coop charting program does not work so well. The program must be changed. One big change has already been made. The land based search for Coast and Geodesic Survey markers has been eliminated. We are now focused where we should be focused: on the water.

We can help NOAA effectively by, focusing our attention on finding and reporting chart errors. Once a USPS member has located an error there needs to be a **simple** downloadable form to report that error to the squadron's Co-op Charting Chairman. There is really no need for this to be a long or detailed form. NOAA will go out to the area and do their own assessment of the error and their own detailed correction. Notification of an error is enough. Correction of the error is unnecessary and unwanted. Like many agencies and companies NOAA wants to know when one of their products is not quite right. They want feed-back from their customers. It seems that sending an error report to the District level is unnecessary. To send it to the National level from the squadron seems like a better alternative. The squadron chairman should check it over and then send it on to the National chairman who can give it to NOAA.

There is a big undone job out there for District Coop Charting committees. This unmet need is marina reports. Members of USPS across the country want information about marinas. The Coast Pilot put out by NOAA is of very limited use and commercial publications seem to focus their highest praises for their biggest advertisers. Wouldn't it be wonderful if you could get marina reports on a District Website? The D5 Website could tell you about the over-night choices available in harbors like Annapolis, Rock Hall, and Yorktown. If you wanted to cruise outside home waters you could check the District Websites in other regions. When each of the Districts got this information collected, organized and displayed it would be a simple matter for NOAA to use it for any publications they might put out in the future. In the meantime a new and worthwhile benefit has been created for USPS members. The required yearly interaction between marina owners and squadron members might increase our presence at the places where many boats are kept. This in turn, might lead to a better understanding of USPS by the boating public.

Making changes is not easy, but some changes can be clearly for the better.

Education Department

Fall classes began at A.I. du Pont High School on September 14. Ten students are currently enrolled in the three module version of Marine Electronics being instructed by Randy Williamson.

Piloting is tentatively scheduled for late spring. This course, one of our most popular Advanced Grade courses for the novice boater, has long been a mainstay subject for WPS members.

Your Bridge and Executive Committee remain committed to making boating education available to membership through both the full course as well as the 2 hour per course seminar formats. Your course/subject inputs (desires) are not only helpful, but actively requested. With your help we can continue to offer relevant boating education based on the needs of our membership.

during World War II, WPS taught classes in navigation and seamanship to the U.S. military servicemen. Each year in May, all students in the Advance Piloting class were scheduled to do the plotting and calculations aboard one of the vessels in the AP navigation contest. An afternoon Squadron picnic completed the day. Often this was at Sassafras Farm, where P/Cs Ralph Dodge & Larry Livingston, DuPont retirees, lived and grew holly trees for sale. One of P/C Hal Johnson's many boats, the "Ossipee VII", had previously belonged to Larry Livingston. It had an obvious sag in the cabin top. A too-heavy machine gun had been mounted there when the government had borrowed the boat during the war. The Livingston's had a manual pump organ on board that was used for sing-alongs at Squadron rendezvous.

It would be a great help to the WPS history project if you could share your knowledge and experiences about the earlier days of our organization and send them on to Barbara Sharpless, Pam Orris (editor of this fantastic newsletter), or to a member of the Executive Committee.
